GGSG Science College has been working throughout the year to get its very own 'Science Roadshow' working with local Primary Schools. Mr. Ken Harrison has designed a series of workshops which were offered to a range of Primary Schools and he has been busy taking his workshops out. The workshops are designed to engage Primary aged children with Science through a series of demonstrations and hands on activities. As an extension of this the 'Science Roadshow Plus' is deliberately aimed at engaging the parents of the children as they arrive to pick up their children at the end of the day.

This term has been an 'exploratory' series of bookings, but the plan is to extend the shows across the school year starting in September 2006. On Monday 19<sup>th</sup> June, GGSG Science College was pleased to welcome Johnny Ball (of 'Think of a Number' and Children's television fame) to the Woodville Halls in Gravesend.



He performed the entertaining and informative 'Funtastic Maths and Science' to a packed house both in the morning and the afternoon. In all, almost 1500 children in years 4 to 7 enjoyed the shows, from a range of schools across the Gravesham region and beyond.

# Lead ICT in Science School

As a consequence of being a Science College, GGSG was able to bid to the Specialist Schools and Academies Trust (SSAT) to become a 'Lead ICT in Science School'. Our successful bid means that we have been chosen from several schools in the South East to represent the SSAT in the national network of Lead ICT in Science Schools. As well as attracting additional funding for this scheme, it recognises both the investment we have made in ICT across the Science and Maths faculties as well as the vision and skill of the teachers in those faculties at using ICT to enhance and develop teaching and learning.

### Science College-Looking Ahead to 2006/07

There are several events already planned for our students next year and more is being planned. The events already scheduled are:

<u>13<sup>th</sup>-15<sup>th</sup> September</u> – For Year 11 students, a residential course at Wye College, organised by Imperial College. This event is entitled 'Entrepreneurial Bioscience' and looks at DNA techniques.

<u>22<sup>nd</sup> September</u> – For Year 8 students, working with other local Year 8 students on an 'adaptation and habitat' event at St. Margaret's Bay near Dover.

<u>13<sup>th</sup>-16<sup>th</sup> October</u> – For Year 7 students, a chance to experience a residential course on Space, at the European Space Camp and practice their language skills. A joint event between Science and Modern Foreign Languages.

<u>10<sup>th</sup>-13<sup>th</sup> November</u> – For Year 9 students, a residential experience in Northern France looking at different Science topics (Sea Life, rocketry, cooking and chocolate) as well as the horrors of both the First and Second World Wars. This will also be a good opportunity to practice their language skills. This is a joint initiative between Science, Modern Foreign Languages and Humanities.

<u>8<sup>th</sup>-11<sup>th</sup> June</u> - For Year 8 students, a residential course in Torquay covering Geology, Forensic Science and Leadership. This is a joint initiative between Science, Humanities and Creative Arts.

<u>February 2007</u> – For Year 8, another chance to experience 'Maths Workshops' provided by Millennium Mathematics Project, Centre for Mathematical Sciences, University of Cambridge.

These are just some of the upcoming events and activities, and we hope that as many students as possible get involved. There will also be public lectures and events for parents, and the support of parents at these events is essential if we are to maintain and build an interesting and dynamic programme across the whole school community

## Uniform

#### Sixth Form

A reminder that all those joining or returning to the Sixth Form in September must adhere to the arrangements for Sixth Form dress, as outlined in the letter sent out with your daughters. If you have not seen the letter, please contact the school office. We reserve the right to send students home to change if they are not properly dressed.

#### Key Stage 3 and 4

May I remind you that all uniform should be checked over the Summer and if kilts are too short they should be replaced for September. Some of the kilts are now very short! I have enclosed a copy of the uniform for September and there are no changes this year.

The uniform will be reviewed annually by staff and the school council for anomalies that may exist. However, I emphasise that we have no plans to change the uniform in any major way.

Please be reminded that only discreet make up is acceptable. It does not include eyeshadow, eyeliner or lipstick. Students should not dye their hair; any noticeable change may lead to your daughter being sent home. We have noticed in recent months that some students are returning to school after the weekend with painted nails (sometimes even nail extensions). Please make sure this has been removed before Monday morning!

Flesh coloured tights and trainer socks can be worn until  $1^{st}$  October.

Thank you to those of you who send in items of second hand uniform. They are gratefully received by new and existing parents alike. I shall be discussing with the Parents Association how we might develop this service.

## Padlocks for Lockers

To circumvent many of the problems we have experienced we have decided to supply all the padlocks for girls' lockers ourselves in future. We will be moving to a common procedure for all lockers, whether of the padlock variety or the integral lock variety.

When students return in September they will be allocated a locker. If this is of the padlock variety, it will come with a padlock attached. All girls will need to go to the Finance Office and pay a £5 deposit, and they will then be issued with a key.

The deposits are, of course, returnable at the end of the year on the production of the key. During the year, lost keys can be replaced at a cost of  $f_{1.50}$ .

As usual, we will be asking all girls to <u>empty their</u> <u>lockers before they leave for the summer holiday</u>. If any lockers are not emptied, the Premises staff will do this during the summer holiday; this may involve cutting off the existing padlocks (which is one thing our new arrangements should solve in the future!).



### Arrangements for Parents Being Away

It occasionally happens that parents make arrangements for their daughter to stay with a friend or relative whilst they are away on holiday or business. We would be grateful if you could make us aware of such arrangements by writing to the Form Tutor or Head of Year providing details of name, address and contact number. You will understand this is important in case we need to contact you. Thank you.

## School Fund - Reminder

# School Meals

The school attempts to match the pricing structure operated by KCC in other schools. At present, this is hard to assess for September as KCC have not announced their new pricing structure. While we apologise for this situation, what we can announce is:-

- From September the price of a main meal plus dessert is likely to be in the region of £1.80 (currently £1.70).
- New menus will be on offer to meet the government's new healthy eating guidelines.
- A breakfast option will continue to be offered.

I also include the Assessment Pattern for 2006-07, with an explanation of our contacts with parents. Please note that we have altered the timing in the year of Year 8, 10 and Upper Sixth examinations and of the Year 7 and 10 Parents Evenings. We have also introduced information meetings for Parents at the beginning of Lower Sixth, Year 10 and Year 9.
