#### **Dear Parents**

The new school year has got off to a fine start as we are fully operational as a Specialist Science College. We were pleased with our students' results which continue to put our school high up in the performance tables. You will find details of our results in the Head's Report which you will receive this week.

Students (and staff) have been able to enjoy new facilities from the outset. Our Science block was opened on 7 September 2005 by Paul Carter, KCC Cabinet Member with responsibility for Education. It has been named the Rosalind Franklin Centre after a female scientist famous for her work on DNA. We hope her achievements will be an inspiration to our students.

We are also delighted with the new Learning Resources Centre which incorporates the new Library with a suite of computers for research as well as a Careers Library and Sixth Form study area. We have also been able to create a dual purpose classroom with desks which can be traditional and also provide ICT facilities. Students have been consulted about the opening hours of the new Learning Resources Centre. In response to their request the opening hours will be 8.30am-4.30pm.

### **Building Schools for the Future**

As I informed you in my May newsletter Gravesham Headteachers are currently working with KCC developing planned improvement for Secondary Education in our area capitalising on the huge investment Gravesham will receive through Building Schools for the Future.

Students are beginning to get involved through the Student Council. In July a small group attended a Borough wide student consultation workshop organised by DEMOS, the following students from GGSG represented the school and had a thoroughly enjoyable day discussing ideas, likes and dislikes about their school learning experience. ### **Switch on to Science**

Saturday 17<sup>th</sup> September saw several students and staff have an early start to their weekend as they waited outside the school gates for a coach to the Tate Modern in London. Not for a tour of the gallery (although there was an opportunity for that as well), but for an inaugural Science event called 'Switch On to the Science of the Thames', an event inspired and coordinated by Mr McCorkell, Science College Director, in partnership with the Thames Estuary Partnership.

With nine other schools across the South East and London regions, teams of year 10 students were treated to hands on workshops, designed and delivered by a wide range of commercial and public bodies from the Thames region.



The aims of the day were to expose our students to the wide range of science based careers on their doorstep, as well as give an opportunity for companies to express their commitment to corporate social responsibility.

The day was a great success with each team of students experiencing two workshops during the day. Our students enjoyed a workshop on the Archaeology of the Thames, led by Museum of London Archaeological Society in the morning and tested wind power generators under the direction of RWE nPower in the afternoon.

Early evaluation of the event suggests considerable enthusiasm amongst both the schools and companies to repeat the event next year, perhaps trying to make it larger if a suitable venue and source of funding can be found. This event also marks the beginning of a series of innovative events planned through the Science College at GGSG aimed at engaging local young people in the opportunities and excitement of Science.

# **Expedition to Central America**

This Summer, two groups of students went to Central America to experience life in countries very different from their own. The two groups had alternative itineraries, but they all had the chance to trek in the jungle, cook their own food on open fires and see the animals of the jungle up close. Both groups went into Guatemala, Belize and Mexico and some of the wild creatures they saw were Boa Constrictor snakes over 2m long, scorpions in their washing up bowl, tarantulas in the shower, jaguar footprints in the morning and howler monkeys in the treetops. They even camped next to a lake full of crocodiles! The students had to solve everyday problems, such as buying, carrying and then cooking provisions for several days in the jungle without being able to phone through to Tesco's. One group started the expedition running away from hurricane 'Emily' which was expected to touch land exactly where they were hoping to camp within the next 12 hours! Organising accommodation and travel became second nature to them and hopefully, they have now stopped smelling of sweat, mud and river water and appreciate just how lucky we are in the West to have clean running water and proper showers. Thank you to Mrs Pina and Miss Vamplew for organising the expedition.

# **Teaching & Learning**

The beginning of term has seen a number of developments in Teaching and Learning at the school. Year 7 girls are the first year group to follow our new "Learning to Learn" course. They have one lesson per fortnight and cover areas such as learning styles, note taking, revision techniques, mind mapping, self review and target setting. The intention of the course is to help our students at the beginning of their time at GGSG to become better learners by giving them a range of techniques to use and by clearly setting out and reinforcing our expectations of students as partners in the learning process. The course is being taught by Ms Hare, the Head of Year7, who planned and designed it in consultation with Mrs Bell and Mr Barron.

Older students starting a new Key Stage have also benefited from an introduction to the new demands they will face. Year 10 students were taken off timetable for the morning of September 30th for a programme of activities designed to prepare them for GCSE and to help them become more effective learners. Year 12 students had a similar experience for the beginning of AS study on September 12<sup>th</sup>. Both sessions stressed the importance of homework, taking good notes, reviewing notes, and approaching their work in a serious and committed way. Actively participating in lessons and using their initiative to do wider reading and study around the topic they were doing were also covered. Please support us in helping students to become more effective learners by reinforcing these points with the girls at home.
